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## Why extortionate hotel private residences are the ultimate lure for the super rich in New

£13m private residences in the Big Apple come fully serviced by five-star hotels – and they're selling like hotcakes

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Really wealthy people tend to spend a lot of money trying to simplify their lives - to

minimise the effort and hassle that comes with ordinary living. They often do this by getting staff, but then staff still need to be managed. That's where private residences attached to luxury hotels come in. They offer the

space and privacy of home with all the staff, security and facilities of a five-star hotel. And, of course they provide hotels with the additional funding they need to continue building their empires, so it's a win-win for all concerned. New York is definitely having a 'moment' on this front, with a number of leading

international hotel brands from Aman to Waldorf Astoria unveiling glossy residential projects over the next two years. And they want to get their residences right because if they don't, it risks damaging the reputation of their hotel brand.



The world's number one wealth hub, it's perhaps unsurprising that New York is

leading the charge here. According to the latest Wealth Report by estate agent Knight Frank, there are now 180,060 UHNWIs in the US - that's over a third of the global total - and more of them live in New York than in any other city worldwide.

The same report, which checked in with a number of New York's top wealth

managers, states that a lot of the richest people in America got wealthier in 2020 and that 33% of American UHNWIs have said they plan to buy a new home in 2021. Some are doing so as a means of diversifying their investments, others are responding in their change in lifestyle or commuting patterns as a result of the pandemic. So what are these branded residences actually offering? Aman New York, opening in

the next few weeks, is the group's first urban hotel with residences. Designed by Jean-Michel Gathy and located in the iconic Crown Building built in 1921 on the corner of  $5^{\rm th}$  Avenue and  $57^{\rm th}$  Street, it has 83 hotel rooms (floors five to 12) and 22 private residences (floors 15 to 30), starting at \$4.5m for a one-bedroom (although these are all gone and the cheapest remaining start from \$13.5m).




"For Aman, New York has been on the agenda for a long time, partly driven by the Aman guests who have been requesting a New York City Aman property for

years," says Vanessa Grout, Head of Global Residences, Aman. "We've seen that buyers who have been looking for a home in New York near Central Park are excited by Aman Residences New York. It's a unique offering - five-star hotel services within a landmark building which is woven into the fabric of Manhattan." With full hotel service, the branded residences will also have privileged access to signature Italian and Japanese restaurants, a 14th floor wraparound outdoor terrace, a

piano bar, jazz club, wine room and a three-floor Aman Spa with a big indoor pool, Moroccan hammam and grooming and beauty salon. With one-to-six bedrooms, there has definitely been an attempt to provide as authentic a home as possible, so for example, you'll find working fireplaces in both living and bedroom spaces. "We've seen a surge in interest in larger, family-sized homes," says Grout. "In our

hotels, we're also seeing demand for longer stays and the feedback from our guests is that they are looking for simplicity and security when they travel - our residences delivers this. In New York we have just 22 Residences, which is a very limited number of homes with a very private and detailed experience for our residents."



The hotel group's first standalone residences in the Americas, they're a five-minute drive - or fifteen-minute walk - from the hotel on Columbus Circle. While residents can use all the facilities of the hotel, their own apartment building will have 24-hour hotel-style concierge and its own gym, spa, library and rooftop pool with views over Central Park. Also opening next year is Six Senses New York, in XI - a development of two wonky-


looking towers overlooking both the High Line and the Hudson River in West

Chelsea, by architect Bjarke Ingels (BIG). In addition to a hotel and rather extraordinary spa, there will be 87 condominium private residences in one tower and 149 in the other. Then there's the Ritz-Carlton New York, NoMad ('North of Madison Square Park'), which will include sixteen one-and-two-bedroom penthouse residences on the top four floors of the hotel, by which they will be fully serviced. Looking a little further up the road, when the iconic and vast Waldorf Astoria, which celebrates its 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year, re-opens early 2023 after a giant top-to-toe
